CONGRESS FORMAT

Introduction

The program has been designed to present the latest scientific information and to deal with the challenge of providing more for less. The latter objective will be addressed by addressing critical care realities in high and low income countries. This will also be the first World Congress with active participation of InFact (International Forum of Acute Care Trialists) and the GSA (Global Sepsis Alliance).

The Durban 2013 scientific programme starts on Wednesday 28 August and closes on Sunday 1 September 2013. The meeting will cover the entire spectrum of critical care disciplines in alignment with the central theme of "Critical Care for All".

The scientific component of the program will focus on key issues in critical care in a format that will incorporate plenary lectures, thematic sessions, cutting-edge Meet-the-Expert sessions with interactive audience participation, interactive debates, clinical ward rounds, round table meetings, handson workshops, industry sponsored symposia and the presentation of original scientific research in the form of free oral communications and poster presentations.

Plenary Sessions

"State of the Art" presentations by leading experts in the field. These unopposed sessions will constitute a regular feature of meeting.

Thematic Sessions

Presentations by well-known authorities and experts on related topics. Each session will comprise of 4 lectures and a discussion period on the theme. These sessions will run in parallel.

Clinical Ward Rounds

An interactive session which includes a case presentation to a clinical expert.

Meet-the-Experts Session

These 90 minute sessions are designed to address cutting edge issues by a panel of clinical experts. This session will focus on stimulating audience participation and robust debate.

Workshops

Practical hands-on sessions which will be restricted to a limited number of participants.

ABSTRACTS

Submission deadline: 28 February 2013

Invitation to submit

The Scientific Programme Committee of the 11th Congress of the World Federation of Societies of Intensive and Critical Care Medicine invites the submission of abstracts describing original work or case reports from any field of critical care. All abstracts must relate to unpublished work. Any abstracts related to previously published work (including via the internet) will not be accepted.

Submission

Abstracts must be submitted only via the link on the website www.criticalcare2013.com

Accepted submissions will be presented as posters. A selection comprising the best abstract submissions will be chosen for presentation as oral communications. Once accepted, detailed instructions regarding the presentations will follow. Abstracts submission is subject to the registration of the presenting author (A User ID and a password will be created to access the online submission form). Abstracts submitted by fax or email will be ineligible for consideration.

Please note that the submitting author is considered also to be the presenting author. No modification of the abstract can be made after submission. It is the authors' responsibility to submit abstracts in a perfect order with no errors in spelling and grammar. The same author may submit more than one abstract. Please do not submit multiple copies of the same abstract. Abstract submission indicates acceptance of and compliance with the rules outlined in this Abstract section. Failure to adhere to these rules will result in rejection of the abstract.

Work by clinical fellows will receive special consideration if it is indicated in the submission process. The deadline for all submissions is 17:00 (Standard South African Time) on 28 February 2013. No extensions or late-breaking abstracts will be permitted.

Reviewing/Selection

All abstracts will be sent to 2 reviewers. A third reviewer will be invited if there is a disagreement regarding acceptance of the abstract. Your abstract may be considered for an award. The abstract will (depending on the nature of the study) be scored on the following criteria which may include:

Scientific merit of the abstract Adequate sample size Statistical analysis Analysis of qualitative data Adherence to instructions, and Originality of work The reviewers will evaluate the abstract and will return one of the following results:

Accepted
Accepted - Subject to changes being made
Rejected

Case reports will be accepted if approved by the academic committee but may not be eligible for a prize or inclusion in the abstracts published. The Scientific Programme Committee will communicate the results via email to the contact/presenting author on 15 April 2013. Where an abstract is 'accepted subject to changes', the Scientific Programme Committee will send to the presenting author, details of the changes required. All amended abstracts must be received by 24:00 South African Standard Time 22 April 2013 for a second assessment by 2 reviewers, after which a final result (of Accepted or Rejected) for the amended abstracts will be returned by 10 May 2013.

The final result will be decided by the Scientific Programme Committee. The decision of the Scientific Programme Committee will be final. If you do not receive an email response by 16 April 2013, please check the status of your abstract with Kerry Firmani from the Congress Secretariat (Kerryf@turnergroup.co.za)

Acceptance

Registration fees for the presenting author will not be waived. Registration and the payment of registration fees need to be confirmed by 25 May 2013.

Presentation

The Scientific Programme Committee reserves the right to decide on the final form of presentation. Submission of an abstract constitutes a commitment by the presenting author(s) to attend the Congress and present the findings. Expenses associated with the preparation, submission and presentation of an abstract are the responsibility of the presenting author(s). If accepted, the presenting author(s) is required to pay all fees associated with the conference, including but not limited to: travel, accommodation and registration. In the event that the presenting author is unable to attend the Congress one of the co-authors may present instead. However, we regret that the registration fee for the presenting author cannot be refunded and the co-author will need to register separately.

Publication

Abstracts accepted will be collected in a CD-ROM to be distributed to Congress participants. WFSICCM does not edit or proof read abstracts. Abstracts will be reproduced as submitted. It is therefore the authors' responsibility to check the linguistic accuracy and submit abstracts without errors in spelling or grammar. Selected accepted abstracts will be printed as submitted in the Journal of Critical Care. Please note that the abstract size may, however, be reduced.

Withdrawing

Abstracts may be withdrawn by completing the withdrawal form by 25 May 2013. This will remove the abstract from the programme and the abstract supplement.

Scientific Standards

By submitting an abstract, the presenting author(s) confirms that:

- the abstract has not been submitted to any other meeting,
- the abstract displays data that has not been published
- the scientific material found within the abstract will not be published other than in abstract form prior to the Congress and
- the work described is original to the authors and was conducted in accordance with current ethical standards and regulations in biomedical research (Declaration of Helsinki, guiding principles for biomedical research involving animals recommended by WHO)
- where required the research has been approved by an institutional ethics review board and that
- participants have given their informed consent,
- all authors have consented to be included as coauthors, have read and approved the abstract and its contents, and agree with the results stated, that all authors are acknowledged of and agree with the abstract submission rules, and permit the abstract, if accepted, to be published as submitted,
- the authors agree that WFSICCM may publish abstracts in the Journal of Critical Care and may record the presentation for subsequent use as it deems appropriate.

Authors must also indicate whether they have any financial agreement with any organisation or company involved in the research. Grant acknowledgements must be indicated as well. Note: All visuals of participants/patients shown must have informed consent. Speakers must declare conflict of interest before starting their presentations.

Durban

The biggest and busiest city in the province of KwaZulu-Natal (although not the capital), Durban features vastly different coastal regions and landscapes, with the most spectacular mountain range in the country and the oldest game reserve in Africa not far away.

It is also known as the friendliest city in South Africa, thanks to the great warmth and openness of its people and the laidback lifestyle that everyone here enjoys.

Durban Beaches

Durban has glorious sandy beaches that disappear into the Indian Ocean where the water (even in winter) has an average temperature of 19°C (66°F)

Durban is a magnet for sun worshippers and surfers and has been listed as one of the world's top 10 family beach holiday destinations by Lonely Planet's *Travel with Children*. There are shark nets in the sea off the main beaches and the latter are patrolled from sunrise to sunset by lifeguards.

Climate

Durban has year round sunshine. It's sub-tropical, with warm wet summers, mild frost-free winters, and an average daytime temperature of between 20°C (68°F) and 23°C (73°F). Perfect!

During the Congress the average temperatures are expected to be a minimum of 13°C (55°F) and a maximum of 23°C (73°F). The average rainfall in August is 4 wet days and 6 wet days in September.

King Shaka International Airport

Durban is served by King Shaka International Airport which is located 35 kilometres north of the city centre at La Mercy. Shuttle buses and taxis operate from the Airport to the city centre. For more information, visit http://lamercy.info/

Car Hire

The roads in Durban are in good condition and well signposted. Remember, in South Africa, you drive on the left hand side of the road! There are a number of reputable car hire companies operating in Durban.

- An International Driver's Permit carried in conjunction with your national driving license is recommended and must be printed or authenticated in English.
- If your license does not have a photograph on it, then you must also carry your passport with you so that you can be identified as the legal holder of the driving
- Please note that the car hire companies might have different regulations regarding the length of time that you need to have held a driving license, so it is advisable to check with your car hire company about their requirements.
- Always make sure documentation is carried with you at all times when driving.

Shuttle Transport

Shuttle Transport will be offered to all registered participants and registered accompanying persons; between appointed hotels and the International Convention Centre for the duration of the congress. A schedule of times and details will be displayed in the hotel foyer and at the convention centre.

Taxis

Metered taxis are common, safe and relatively inexpensive. These taxis will be operating in the key Congress zones, including the airport, beachfront, city centre and other accommodation and entertainment nodes within Durban. Registered metered taxis are clearly marked with an official eThekwini Transport Authority decal, so that you can be assured of the quality and safety of the service that you are getting from your taxi.

Passports and Visas

Every visitor to South Africa must have a valid passport. Passport holders from more than 80 countries, including USA, Canada, UK, Japan and the EU can visit South Africa without a visa. Information regarding visas can be obtained from your travel agent or the South African diplomatic or consular representative in your area. Passports should have at least 2 completely empty pages otherwise entry may be denied. Passports must be valid for at least 6 months after your intended date of departure. Delegates requiring visas, and who intend taking tours to neighbouring Southern African countries, are advised to secure a multiple entry visa. Tourists must satisfy immigration officers that they have the means of support for the duration of their stay in the country and return/onward tickets. Visas cannot be obtained on arrival. A list of countries that currently do not require a visa can be found on the "Applying for a South African visa" page of the SA Government website: www.dha.gov.za

If required, upon request, the Congress Secretariat is willing to send you a letter of invitation. It should be understood that this letter will be sent only to help participants to raise travel funds or to obtain a visa. A letter of invitation is not a commitment on the part of the organisers to provide any financial support. Please note that only registered delegates who have paid their Congress registration fees will be issued with a letter of invitation.

Currency / Banks / Exchange

The unit of currency in South Africa is the South African Rand (ZAR) and is indicated with a capital R so that, for example, three Rand and fifty cents would be written R3.50. South Africa has a decimal currency system with one Rand equalling

100 cents.

Rand notes denominations are R200, R100, R50, R20, and R10 and of the coins are R5, R2, R1, 50c, 20c, 10c and 5c. The following exchange rates were applicable at time of sending out this document.

1 Euro = ZAR 10.50

1 United State Dollar = ZAR 8.50

Facilities for cashing traveler's cheques are available at banks (operating hours are Monday - Friday 09:00-15:30, Saturdays 08:30-11:00) and at most hotels. Banks are closed on Sundays. Foreign exchange agencies are open during the week and on Saturdays. Automatic teller machines (ATM) are open 24 hours and are located at most banks as well as at the Congress Venue. International credit cards (Visa, Diners Club, MasterCard and American Express) are accepted at the majority of hotels, restaurants and shops.

ATM

ATMs are located all around the city. They can also be used for cash advances on major credit cards such as MasterCard or VISA.

Credit cards

Major credit cards are accepted in most hotels, stores and restaurants.

Electricity Supply / Power

The electricity supply in South Africa is 220 - 240 volts, 50 Hz. The connection for appliances is a round three-pin plug. Most hotels provide dual-voltage two-pin razor sockets (100-120 volts and 220-240 volts).

Health / Insurance

There are no compulsory vaccination requirements for persons entering South Africa although a certificate for yellow fever is required if you are entering from certain South American or sub-Saharan African countries.

Certain parts of the country, mainly in the north, have been designated as malaria risk areas. If you intend travelling to one of these areas, it is essential that you take prophylaxis before arrival and whilst in the area. Protective clothing and insect repellents should also be used. Durban is a malaria risk-free area.

South African doctors and dentists are highly trained professionals and hospitals are well equipped.

Participants are requested to make their own arrangements with respect to health insurance prior to departure and consult their local general practitioner for personal expert advice.

It is safe to drink tap water throughout South Africa. However, for those who prefer bottled mineral water, this is readily available in various stores.

Smoking is prohibited by law in most public buildings in South Africa (airports, Durban International Convention Centre, restaurants etc.) except in designated smoking areas.

Anyone requiring medical attention while in the Convention Centre should report to the information or registration desk for direction.

Safety

For those participants who have not previously visited South Africa, or Durban, and are concerned about personal safety, we wish to assure all visitors that Durban is a great place to visit but like any major city, it has good and bad areas. Common sense will ensure a trouble free and enjoyable congress and vacation. The area around the International Convention Centre, Durban and adjacent hotels is safe and well monitored at all times but we advise that you do not walk alone after dark in unpopulated streets. Ostentatious displays of wealth should be avoided at all times.

During the Congress, the information desk at the ICC and your hotel's concierge will be able to assist you with information on places to visit and the appropriate means of transport.

Shopping

Durban is home to many numerous world-class shopping malls, most of which include big chain stores and smaller boutiques as well as banking facilities, restaurants, coffee shops and movie theatres. Depending on their locations, some malls also offer curio shops. Most malls offer safe, payper-hour parking.

Most shops in the city centre and suburbs open between 08:00 and 17:00 to 17:30. Shops in major shopping malls open at 09:00 and close at 19:00 or later, including on Sundays and most public holidays. Government agencies still keep to traditional weekday only hours. Most banks close at 15:30, and have limited Saturday morning opening times. Muslim-owned businesses close at noon on Fridays and reopen at 13:00.

Major Shopping Malls include: Gateway Shopping Experience and the Pavilion Shopping Centre.

A visit to one of Durban's markets is a great way to pick-up gifts and souvenirs from a wide variety of local designers, artists and entrepreneurs.

Vat/Tax Refunds

Vat of 14% is levied on nearly all goods and services. Foreign tourists may claim back VAT paid on items that will be taken out of the country. Original tax invoices, foreign passport, plus all of the items on which a refund is claimed, must be presented at the VAT Refund Administration Office or an appointed RSA Customs and Excise Official on departure from South Africa, and the total VAT on these items will be refunded.

Tipping

Gratuities are expected in South Africa. A guideline for visitors is the following: Airport porters ZAR5.00 per item, taxis 10% of fare, waitrons in restaurants 10% of bill.

Telecommunications

Mobile phones: Referred to locally as 'cell phones'. The main areas of South Africa are covered by all networks. You can use a GSM/tri-band phone from outside the country in South Africa, if you arranged for international roaming before leaving home.

Public phones are either coin or card operated.

International telephone dialling code is 00 + the country code when dialling another country from South Africa.

It is also possible to rent a cell phone at the airport or from a cell phone provider in the city.
